Fairtrade Fortnight 2024

The Fairtrade Foundation moved the timing of this national event for this year from the usual February date to September, as they wanted to mark the 30th anniversary of the Foundation and they are considering making this a permanent September occasion.

Along with other groups, SFTG feel that the new timing is difficult for a number of reasons. Schools have just returned after the summer holidays and are embroiled in the busy start of a new school year. People without school age children are often on

holiday themselves. Churches are involved with harvest festivals and starting to organise Christmas events.

SFTG are in the process of writing to the Fairtrade Foundation to express these concerns and suggest a move back to the previous Fairtrade Fortnight timing of February. We are aware that the Foundation has received a number of similar requests from various organisations who support Fairtrade throughout the year and have organised special events to promote the movement in February for many years.

To mark this year's September Fairtrade Fortnight, Catriona, one of our members, held a



coffee morning at Heaton Moor Church where Stuart, another **SFTG** member, had a Fairtrade stall. Electronic promotional material was

circulated to councillors for display on the SMBC website.

What's been happening?

Outwood Primary School, one of Stockport's Fairtrade schools, held a Fairtrade assembly in May, at which SFTG member, Fran, spoke to the children about the importance of choosing fairly traded goods. The school also



held a Bake-Off competition which was judged by the Mayor of Stockport, Suzanne Wyatt, SFTG member, Pauline, and two Co-op representatives. The entries were very impressive, making the final decision so difficult that the judges awarded joint competition winners, who both received prizes of Fairtrade goodies donated by the Co-op.

After the hard work of several SFTG members on the renewal of Stockport's Fairtrade Community status in December 2023, the certificate was presented to the Mayor of Stockport, Suzanne Wyatt, in July 2024. This will be displayed in the Town Hall, so take a look next time you visit and, if you can't find it, please ask a member of staff there.

Transform Trade and Traidcraft

After the purchase of the Traidcraft brand name as the trading arm of Transform Trade, there are now a limited number of products available, including cards, toilet rolls and the ever-popular Traidcraft tea.

The Traidcraft website at https://www.traidcraft.org states that they are "using the 'Traidcraft mark' to pioneer other new fair trade products and promote fairness in supply chains which can't yet access the Fairtrade mark" and "to further strengthen the fair trade movement, Traidcraft products are most often sold in partnership with ethical businesses in the UK."

The aim of Transform trade and Traidcraft is to work "alongside producers to rebuild Traidcraft

in the right way - as a positive resource and route to market for communities around the world."

If products are labelled as Traidcraft, the mark shows that fair trade principles are still in place even if the familiar Fairtrade symbol is not yet being used.

Fairtrade News

The first International Fairtrade Textile Forum took place in Paris on 17 October 2024 where a new study was released indicating the better environmental outcomes of producing Fairtrade certified organic cotton as compared to non-Fairtrade cotton. The Fairtrade Foundation's website states that "Cotton that was both Fairtrade and organic or converting to organic outperformed conventional cotton in the areas of greenhouse gas emissions, water usage, and avoidance of chemicals, according to the study. The study also revealed that beyond the benefits of organic farming practices, Fairtrade and organic certification provides economic advantages for cotton farmers, as measured through yields and farmgate prices received by farmers. The combination of these factors contributes to better livelihoods and greater environmental sustainability."

In addition to the excellent quality of Fairtrade cotton, this is another good reason for consumers to choose Fairtrade organic cotton above non-Fairtrade cotton.
